Assistive Listening Technology in Nebraska Courtrooms

Assistive listening technology is designed to enhance speech understanding for individuals with hearing loss, especially in noisy environments, by transmitting sound directly to the listener's ear, bypassing background noise. The Nebraska Judicial Branch partnered with local courts to install infrared assistive listening systems in courtrooms over a two-year period. An infrared system (IR) is ideal in situations where multiple users may be present. It is also more compatible with preserving the historic spaces within our courthouses, since the sound is transmitted via light waves instead of requiring installation of a physical system underneath the floor or in the walls, as would be necessary with an induction loop system. The IR system was also selected for security reasons—because IR transmissions cannot go through walls, this is a more secure option for any sensitive proceedings within the courtrooms. IR systems and devices have been installed in 207 courtrooms including the appellate courtrooms at the Nebraska State Capitol. Only 4 counties- Arthur, Banner, Hooker, and Loup- did not install IR due to those courthouses being rarely, if ever, used.

Shaylene Smith, a local attorney in Crete, shared her story about congenital hearing loss and her experiences with past and current assistive listening options for the now-retired Chief Justice's Summer Tour in August, and in an <u>educational video</u>. Her story highlights how far this technology has come, and what a significant benefit these newly installed systems will be for all judges, attorneys, jurors, court users, and guests in courtrooms across Nebraska.
